

I began to form ideas and a picture of the remarkable cultural wealth these countries all possess.

Nordic Cool 2013 brings an unprecedented number of these treasures to the Kennedy Center with performances by more than 750 participating artists in theater, dance, music, and more. This includes some of the best jazz musicians in the world, as well as one artist who plays on instruments made from ice, including a Norwegian glacier. You'll also be able to enjoy demonstrations and tastings of New Nordic Cuisine; visual art and design exhibitions that will fill the entire building; literary readings and discussions, including one on popular crime novels; and fascinating forums on everything from the meeting of theater and architecture to designs for holistic living. Educational workshops, discussions, and classes will offer contextual information for all of these presentations.

And to complete the journey north, you'll find the beautiful Northern Lights beamed on the Kennedy Center's façade for the duration of the festival. Indeed, *Nordic Cool 2013* will offer an extraordinary experience for all who visit. Expect rapture!

# **METAMORPHOSIS**

Domestic tragedy, or metaphor for totalitarian brutality? The ordinary, unremarkable life of the Samsa family is turned upside down when their adult son, Gregor, is inexplicably transformed one morning into a gigantic insect. His family's feelings of revulsion steadily turn to resentment, with horrifying results. This hugely acclaimed production of Kafka's *Metamorphosis* by Icelandic theater collective Vesturport and the U.K.'s Lyric Hammersmith combines stunning design and daring action, as Gregor lithely negotiates a gravity-defying, split-level set. From a topsy-turvy upstairs room, his insect contorts to the sounds of his family's betrayal, swinging from the rafters as in a veritable gymnasium. Director Gisli Örn Gardarsson's trademark aerial physicality seems a match made in heaven for Kafka's hellish creation. And the evocative music—composed by world-renowned musician and lyricist Nick Cave with longtime collaborator Warren Ellis from The Bad Seeds—further emphasizes Kafka's dreamlike vision, turning it into an electrifying reality.

How far would you go to be immortalized in cyberspace? In this riveting, multimedia play in two acts, the lengths—and the limits—to this question are precariously navigated by three lost souls whose paths fatefully intertwine: a conceptual artist grieving over her son's death, an HIV-positive boy-prostitute seeking the truth about his past, and a terminally ill, closeted gay businessman longing for the love his marriage could never provide. Starting with a sparse set, up-and-coming Norwegian theater artist Alan Lucien Øyen and his company Winter Guests surround these characters with two revolving walls, juxtaposing their interactions with live video and using smartphones and laptops as the only props. Also taking inspiration from a biography of real-life shipping mogul John Fredriksen, once the richest man in Norway, Øyen treads the boundaries of fact vs. fiction—and how we attempt to stage and preserve our fragile lives.

Winner of the 2007 "Best Show" Reumert Award, Denmark's foremost recognition in the performing arts, August is a joyously moving and thoughtprovoking wordless comedy about the basic human condition. The story begins quite simply: four individuals go for a stroll in a dark and empty space. Utterly vulnerable to their surroundings, they stumble upon tiny fragments of life we all struggle with—wonder and anxiety, enthusiasm and anger, fear and expectation, victory and defeat. # **HEDDA GABLER**

"Good God—people don't DO such things!" These searing words from Henrik Ibsen's classic play beg the burning question: what shocking acts are committed by the uncompromising Hedda Gabler—one of the most complex female characters ever created for the stage? Used to the luxurious life of a wealthy general's daughter, Hedda finds herself increasingly discontent as the wife of an aspiring, middle-class scholar. When the return of a past lover threatens to reveal her true desires, and simultaneously stifle her husband's career, Hedda must find a way to salvage her spiraling emotions and diminishing social status—at any cost. Norway's National Theatre has long been associated with the late Norwegian playwright's boundary-pushing work. Originally created for the National Theatre's 2010 Ibsen Festival, Peer Perez Øian's smart, streamlined production challenges our classic understanding of Ibsen's famously tormented heroine, while questioning motivation, freedom, and choice in today's society.

Stockholm's Royal Dramatic Theatre presents the U.S. premiere of its acclaimed stage adaptation of Ingmar Bergman's four-time Academy Award®-winning film, inspired in part by the influential Swedish filmmaker's own upbringing. Set at the turn of the 20th century, this epic drama follows three generations of the wellto-do Ekdahl family, led by an eccentric, widowed matriarch and her three sons. The eldest and his wife run a theater—a nurturing world of fantastical delights to their two young children, Fanny and Alexander. But after a tragic turn of events, their mother remarries, thrusting the two siblings into the gloomy, austere home of their strict bishop stepfather. this most personal project of the late Bergman, the company's one-time manager and frequent guest director for more than half a century.

# **OLLI HIRVONEN QUARTET**

A graduate student at Manhattan School of Music, Finnish guitarist Olli Hirvonen and his quartet have performed at numerous Finnish events, including the Pori Jazz Festival, where Hirvonen was nominated for 2011 Artist of the Year. With Frederick Menzies on tenor saxophone, Jeff Koch on bass, and Philippe Lemm on drums, Hirvonen's international quartet plays music that is distinctively modernistic, drawing influences from rock, jazz, R&B, 21st-century classical music, contemporary art, and literature.

# TERJE ISUNGSET'S ICEMUSIC

One of Norway's most innovative and distinctive percussionists, Terje Isungset collects material from nature—wood, stone, metal, litter, ice—and creates new instruments out of it. He has even composed a musical work based on sounds from the world's largest oil platform. For his *Icemusic*, Isungset carves instruments out of pure ice, including some from the 600-year-old Jostedal glacier. The quality and temperature of the ice determine the sound of the instruments.

# GJERMUND LARSEN TRIO

Praised for his technical and emotional musicality, Gjermund Larsen is an award-winning Norwegian violinist/fiddler and composer. Formed in 2006, the Gjermund Larsen Trio sees him performing with Andreas Utnem (organ and piano) and Sondre Meisfjord (double bass). Gjermund Larsen is distinguished by the gentle warmness of his tunes, the natural tempt of his melodies, and the broad variety of music that ranges from catchy dance works to calm meditations.

# YGGDRASIL

March 1 at 7:30 & 9:30 p.m.

Based in the Faroe Islands, Yggdrasil was founded in 1981 by the Danish composer and pianist Kristian Blak, a 2011 nominee for the Nordic Council Music Prize. Its members have varied musical backgrounds, mainly in jazz, but also in ethnic, folk, rock, and classical music. While the works draw ideas or themes from ethnic material, improvisation ranges from free to classical style.

# THE HEMSING SISTERS

Norwegian violinists Ragnhild & Eldbjørg Hemsing have been playing together since the ages of seven and five, when they first played for the Norwegian Royal Family at the National Theatre in Oslo. Each sister is an acclaimed soloist in her own right, while together they've performed with leading orchestras in Norway and around Europe. In 2003, Ragnhild won First Prize and the Laureate Prize in the Kocian International Violin Competition. Eldbjørg won the competition two years later in 2005.

# **CAROLINE HENDERSON**

Born in Sweden but a Dane since 1983, vocalist and actress Caroline Henderson's *joie de vivre*, passion, and uncompromising attitude have always been the driving forces behind her career, making her one of the most interesting and sought-after singers of our time—a true diva of jazz. Her 2011 box set *Jazz Collection* included six of her solo recordings, among them her acclaimed Danish Music Award–winning Best Vocal Recording *Love or Nothin'*. For the past five years, Henderson has also been a goodwill ambassador for UNICEF.

# **SUNNA GUNNLAUGS TRIO**

March 8 at 7:30 & 9:30 p.m.

Proclaimed an "impressive newcomer" by the Village Voice, Icelandic pianist Sunna Gunnlaugs and her trio bridge the Brooklyn/Reykjavik jazz divide by combining the elegance of the European approach with a fiery New York drive. Gunnlaugs's influences include American pianists such as Bill Evans and Keith Jarrett, as well as Scandinavian musicians Bobo Stenson and Jon Balke. Her playing is "firm yet pliant, moving from fragile vulnerability to robust power" and encompasses "musical depth that doesn't sacrifice inherent accessibility" (All About Jazz).

Sara Marielle, Risten Anine, and Inger Biret Gaup—Sami sisters from Kautokeino in northern Norway—were taught *joik* by their father and other relatives, and are now passing down its techniques to the next generation.



#### March 1

Singer/songwriter Unni Løvlid from Hornindal in west Norway ranks among the most highly respected folk musicians in her country. Her wide-ranging musical activities include concerts and tours in Norway and abroad, and teaching engagements at the Norwegian Academy of Music, the Ole Bull Academy, and the State Theatre Academy. Løvlid has received a number of awards for her contributions to folk singing, and she was voted Norway's 2006 Traditional Musician of the Year.





# GREENLAND / ÅLAND ISLANDS RASMUS LYBERTH / GRETA SUNDSTRÖM

#### March 4

Singer/songwriter Rasmus Lyberth has been captivating Danish and Greenlandic audiences since the 1970s. He has a unique ability to transcend language barriers and convey the drama and beauty of Greenlandic culture. A recipient of the Nordic Council's prestigious Medal of Honor, Lyberth has also been knighted by Her Majesty, Queen Margrethe II of Denmark. Accordion virtuoso Greta Sundström is master of a vast repertoire ranging from classical pieces to folk music and dance-friendly pop tunes. She regularly represents the Åland Islands at festivals and performances throughout the Nordic and Baltic regions and has released several recordings.

# DUO HARPVERK

#### March 5

Duo Harpverk was formed by harpist Katie Buckley and percussionist Frank Aarnink with the aim to commission and perform music for harp and percussion, focusing especially on the work of young composers. To date, they have commissioned more than 60 pieces from composers in Iceland, Denmark, England, Australia, and the United States. The duo has also created a minimalistic improvisation for Swedish artist Ellen Malmgard, which was played alongside her exhibit *Glasdialogen* in 2010. They will perform a program of world premieres by Icelandic composers.

# SOUSOU AND MAHER CISSOKO

#### March 6

Swedish/Senegalese couple Sousou and Maher Cissoko share a destiny shaped by music. Sousou grew up in southern Sweden and fell in love with the *kora*, a West African stringed instrument, when her father started playing with the Gambian *griot* Alagie Mbye in the early 1990s. Maher Cissoko was born into a well-known *griot* family from Casamance, Senegal, and learned to play the *kora* at an early age. Winners of the Best Newcomer Prize at the 2010 Swedish Folk and World Music Gala—and Band of the Year in 2011—the group's music mixes traditional West African and Swedish music, spiced with pop, reggae, *mbalax*, and a pinch of hip hop.

# NANOOK

#### March 7

Nanook immediately became one of the best-known bands in Greenland with the release of its debut album *Seqinitta Qinngorpaatit (Our Sun Is Shining on You)* in 2009. Nanook's music has been featured in the Discovery Channel's series *Flying Wild Alaska*.

Since its founding in 1938, the Danish National Girls Choir has been synonymous with Danish song and the pure Nordic sound. Considered one of the best girls' choirs in the world, they combine old song traditions with new music, always working to develop Denmark's strong

choir tradition through a focus on educating children and youth. This elite ensemble covers a broad repertoire encompassing Grundtvig's hymns, modern compositions, and pop songs without losing its musical spark and infectious enthusiasm.



# FAMILY-SECRETS AND TRUTHS

March 2 at 1:30 p.m.

Is the family falling apart? Whether it's the bloody feuds of Icelandic domestic sagas or the heated marital strife of Strindbergian drama, family has always been the cornerstone of Nordic literature. Moderator Marianne Stecher-Hansen, Professor of Danish and Scandinavian Literature at the University of Washington in Seattle, speaks to authors exploring the individual in relation to family today.

#### Panelists:

Hallgrímur Helgason (Iceland) is perhaps best known for his works 101 Reykjavík, which was made into a popular film, as well as 2001 Icelandic Literary Prize winner Höfundur Íslands (The Author of Iceland) and The Hitman's Guide to House Cleaning.

Anne Swärd (Sweden) is a novelist whose works include Polarsommar (Polar Summer), Kvicksand (Quicksand), and Till sista andetaget (Breathless), which won the 2010 Bokcirklar Award for Novel of the Year.

# NORDIC CRIME: ICE, VOLVOS, AND MURDER

With the late Stieg Larsson ("The Millennium Series" trilogy, which includes *The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo*] the Nordic crime novel achieved its international breakthrough. But is Nordic noir a voice of its own? Moderator Andrew Nestingen, associate professor of Scandinavian Studies at the University of Washington,

leads a discussion with the region's foremost crime novelists who offer their own takes on the success of the genre and its unique characteristics.

#### Panelists:

Johan Theorin (Sweden) writes mostly dark crime stories [Echoes from the Dead] all set on the island of Öland, where he spent much of his childhood. Agnete Friis (Denmark) is a journalist and children's author who also writes crime novels with Lene Kaaberbøl. Vidar Sundstøl (Norway) was awarded the 2008 Riverton Prize for Best Norwegian Crime Novel of the Year, for The Land of Dreams, which has been translated into six languages and will be published by University of Minnesota Press in 2013.

Jarkko Sipila (Finland) has been reporting on Finnish crime for 20 years; he has written 11 books and co-wrote a TV series based on the Takamäki books.

# PRIZE-WINNING LITERATURE

March 3 at 6:30 p.m.

The Nordic Council Literature Prize is awarded for a work of literature written in one of the languages of the Nordic countries that meets a "high literary and artistic standard." Awarded each year since its establishment in 1962, the prize serves to reveal the wide variety of voices that are all part and parcel of the Nordic literary world. Moderator Susan Harris, editorial director of Words Without Borders, speaks with some recent winners, who present their work and discuss the idea of a common Nordic literary tradition.

# Panelists:

Merethe Lindstrøm (Norway) has published a number of short stories and novels. Her latest novel, Days in the History of Silence, won her both the Nordic Council Literature Prize and the Critics' Prize, and is now being translated into seven languages. The book will be

published by Other Press in the U.S. in 2014. Naja Marie Aidt (Denmark) is an author, playwright, screenwriter, and poet whose awards include the 2008 Nordic Council Literature Prize for Bayian (Baboon), a collection of short stories.

Join us for a lively conversation with award-winning husband-and-wife translators Steven T. Hanus Kamban (Faroe Islands) is a novelist, poet, and short story writer whose novella Goldgirl was nominated for the 2012 Nordic Literature Prize. He has received the M.A. Jacobsen Literature Prize twice.

Kristín Ómarsdóttir (Iceland) writes poetry, novels, short stories, and plays. She's been nominated for several prizes, among them the 1999 Nordic Council Literature Prize for her novel Elskan mín ég dey [l'Il Die, My Love).

Nordic mythology has been a literary inspiration for numerous writers of the region. This event explores area mythology in contemporary Nordic poetry. Do the designs of physical theater spaces and venues affect the experiential aspects of the performing arts? Are there other, perhaps surprising, ways of relating architecture and theater? **Pedro Gadanho**, Curator of Contemporary Architecture at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, moderates a panel that discusses perspectives from both sides of the curtain.

#### Panelists:

Jesper Kongshaug (Denmark) is an international lighting designer working in stage, television, art exhibitions, and architecture. His most recent designs include Akram Khan's *Vertical Road* in London and Paul Ruder's *Dancer in the Dark* in Denmark. For *Nordic Cool 2013*, Jesper is recreating the effect of the Northern Lights upon the Kennedy Center.

Marianne Weems (U.S.) is Artistic Director of the theater company The Builders Association. She has directed every production since the company's first, Ibsen's *The Master Builder*, in 1994. Weems is also Head of Graduate Directing at Carnegie Mellon University.

Craig Dykers (U.S. / Norway) is a senior partner at landscape and architecture firm Snøhetta, which he co-founded. The firm's projects include the Opera House in Oslo, the Alexandria Library in Egypt, and the 9/11 Memorial Museum in New York City.



# DESIGNING NATURE: ART AND ARCHITECTURE IN CITIES AND PUBLIC SPACES

Danish architect **Bjarke Ingels** discusses the development, challenges, and responses to sustainable design in public spaces. Johan Olin & Aamu Song (Finland) are co-owners of COMPANY, a design firm based in Helsinki. They've collaborated on clothing, furniture, and accessories with designers in Finland and elsewhere through COMPANY's product lines Made in Belgium, Made in Korea, and Top Secrets of Finland.

Mårten Claesson (Sweden) is an architect and designer educated at Konstfack University College of Arts, Crafts and Design (Stockholm) and Parsons The New School for Design (New York). He founded Claesson Koivisto Rune with Eero Koivisto and Ola Rune in 1995.

# ARTISTS AND AUDIENCES: WHO SEES WHAT?

February 27 at 6 p.m.

Chief Washington Post theater critic Peter Marks moderates a conversation on trends and influences in contemporary Nordic performance. The discussion will touch on the relative importance of tradition and experimentation, the age factor of audiences, whether early arts education in the Nordic countries has affected audience composition, what young adults mostly watch and listen to, and how current technology fits into performance practice.

#### Panelists:

Located outside of Copenhagen, the Louisiana Museum of Modern Art has one of the largest permanent collections in all of Scandinavia. This exhibit is the museum's first in a series that investigates architecture's relationship with culture and identity. New Nordic sets out to explore whether or not certain specifically "Nordic" features appear in architecture and, if so, how they manifest. Each house is an expression of the architect's regional identity and experiences.

Is there a Nordic identity? Can one—despite the tendency of globalization to erase national and cultural differences—still understand identity as something associated with a particular place? In an attempt to answer these questions, this installation begins with another question: "What does Nordic mean to you?" Several cultural personalities from the Nordic countries and territories provide their answers in these small dioramas.

In this exhibition, you can learn more about the Nobel Prize, its founder, the laureates, and their endeavors. # SUP-PLYWOOD, OR HOW TO BE SINGULAR IN THE PLURAL

Hall of Nations

Plywood is one of the oldest mass-produced products in the world. Immanuel Nobel—a Swedish architect, engineer, inventor, and father of Alfred Nobelreinvented the Egyptian lathe for rotating the cutting of thin wood veneers. Plywood has since become one of the most-used products in Nordic design, from molded to tensioned, from furniture to houses. From the 1920s onward, experimentation has built a base for further development of low-cost plywood products intended for a larger public. It is a material most representative of the development of social democracy in the Nordic region. This installation, created by famed Norwegian architecture firm Snøhetta and commissioned for Nordic Cool 2013, features large-scale plywood sculptures created specifically for the festival. They integrate disciplines of interior, landscape, and architectural design. Snøhetta has been working internationally for 15 years, with acclaimed projects that include the Oslo Opera House, the National September 11 Memorial Museum Pavilion in New York, and the Bibliotheca Alexandrina in Egypt.

# **ARCHIVE-ENDANGERED WATERS**

South Atrium Foyer, Open 10 a.m.-9 p.m.

With its frequent rain and summer melts, Iceland is especially suited for waterfalls. However, with the rise of hydroelectric dams, their number has declined in recent years. Multidisciplinary Icelandic artist Rúrí seeks to archive these endangered waters in an interactive, multidisciplinary installation of 52 waterfall

photographs, taken on the banks of both muddy glacial torrents and clear mountain streams. The work encourages user interaction and then presents a strong visual and acoustic experience, with the photographs adding their magnificence to the tremendous sounds resonating through the space.

Kaarina Kaikkonen is one of Finland's leading artists and is known internationally for her large-scale, site-specific environmental installations made from simple recycled materials and domestic items, such as clothing and paper. Created specifically for the festival, the suspended installation takes the shape of a boat broken in two pieces, part of it being lost somewhere, according to the artist.

NORDIC COOL 2013 FILM

Filmmaking came early to Scandinavia, and Denmark's Asta Nielsen was the first international movie star. In the 1920s, Swedish silent directors created some of the most influential works of the period, and later gave Hollywood two of its most legendary stars, Greta Garbo and Ingrid Bergman. Beginning in the 1960s, Nordic governments became heavily involved in film production and culture, creating some of the most successful national cinemas in Europe.

Curated by Richard Peña, Professor of Film Studies at Columbia University and former Program Director for the Film Society of Lincoln Center, the festival's Film Series includes 11 feature-length films. They range from the classic 1921 silent film *The Phantom Carriage*, performed with live piano accompaniment, to recent award winners at international festivals (*Teddy Bear* and *The Almost Man*), to a movie for young audiences.
